

This diary of William Mitchell is probably the hardest to read that I have met to date. It is apparently written with a pencil and it was probably a hard one not a soft one so that it would not need constant sharpening. There are many pages which may have something on them but they cannot be read. It was found that more detail could be seen on the pages when the reproduction is quite a bit darker than the original, and so most pages in this dairy are shown as darker than originally seen.

The early pages are mainly jottings of figures with sometime names shown of people. It is on page 27 of this reproduction that he begins to write seriously about his health, & on page 88 that a diet is suggested. On page 27 he introduces new shorthand symbols which when first come across were not decipherable, and have not yet been deciphered.

In his diaries William Mitchell introduced his own shorthand for some common words. The known ones have been expanded in the text reproduced. There are also some not yet decoded.

Hearing loved voices calling either way.

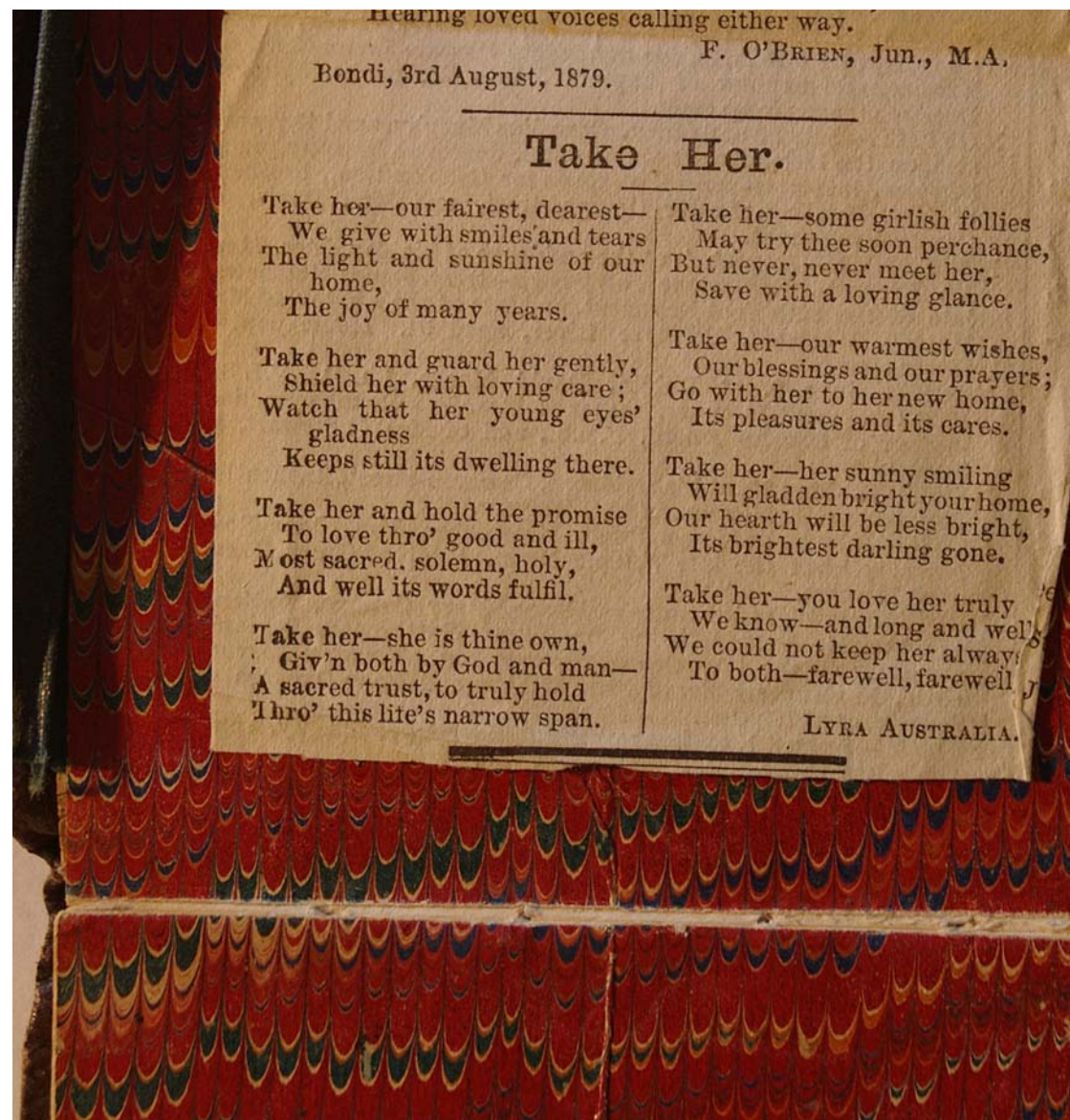
